## Postling Action for Conservation and the Environment (PACE): Debbie Reynolds writes:

## A Christmas Season Log-Down

As the world twists and turns through the maze of Covid guidance and local lockdowns, we start to consider what really matters this Christmas season: our family, our friends and our local environment.

We know the sad tale of our declining nature and wildlife, as the habitats on which they depend disappear under road, house, industry and field. This is where we can give the most important gift of all, we can give life to our parish through the enrichment of our environment.

The increasing reality is that biodiversity is collapsing, with the South East being hard hit. One in ten species is considered at risk from extinction in Kent on our current trajectory.

Postling Action for Conservation and the Environment (PACE) is asking for us all to look at the habitats we are offering our landscape. Providing a log pile, of any size, in a shaded area of our gardens, will not only create a niche environment for fabulous predatory insects such as ground beetles and devil's coach horse, or a cool

ambient hostel for a noble slug and snail-eating toad, or an indulgent larder for a green woodpecker, or the security of shelter for a hibernating queen bee but also... a great way to store carbon.

Log piles can become an attractive feature in a garden, with colourful displays of mosses and lichen or candlesnuff fungus showcasing its vertical snow-white growth. Alternatively, a trailing plant or grand ferns can be planted to create a wonderful garden display. A local log-down will not cost the earth but will provide a crucial sanctuary and opportunity to the living nature we love in Postling.

Gardens can knit our landscape together again. Simple investments in nature such as log piles and small meadow areas provide key habitats that are sadly being lost through the ceaseless pressure to tidy, burn, trim, cut, pave or concrete.
